

1 Focus on Student Learning

Additionally, our collaborative learning teams meet every Wednesday to clarify learning targets for our students, monitor their learning closely and provide students with additional time and support to ensure they're achieving the intended learning targets.

2 Focus on Collaboration

One of CUSD 201's greatest strengths is the collaborative nature of our staff, who work around the common goal of providing the best education for **all** our students. Our CUSD 201 staff consistently work together to plan and tailor their classroom practices to ensure every student achieves a high level.

We began the school year by reviewing our district-wide goals around student achievement and growth. Every Wednesday, our collaborative teams meet to review formative assessment data, identify areas of strength and growth and create data-based, tailored interventions to maximize students' success.

In addition to these areas, our students also have the opportunity to engage in Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) lessons led by Elyce Boonstra, to develop important skills further.

In October, South School had a **special visit from the Westmont Fire Department** and learned all about fire safety, including seeing a real fire truck! Throughout the first semester, students have continued to experience many new learning opportunities and even welcomed new friends starting in the program. With ongoing team collaboration across the building, staff are continuously working to provide students with individualized learning opportunities that foster school-readiness and pre-academic skills to prepare for their eventual transition to kindergarten.

South also had the opportunity to participate in the **Book Angels Program** sponsored by the Beta Phi Women in Education organization with Anderson's Bookshop—where each student received a book of interest to bring home. As we head into the spring, the team is excited to have **Salt Creek Ballet** coming to South for another year.

These initiatives stem from a dedicated committee and teacher's mission to instill healthy eating habits from kindergarten to fifth grade. "Fun Fridays," a student incentive program for good behavior during lunch, is also seeing notably improved cafeteria behavior.

A Tasty Journey Towards Healthy Eating

Manning and Miller students eagerly line up in the cafeteria every month, ready to embark on a delicious journey known as "Try It Tuesday." But what's the story behind this exciting initiative, and why do our elementary students believe they might get popcorn with their chicken? Let's delve into this remarkable transformation.

The cafeteria underwent a significant overhaul, introducing nutritious changes like zero trans-fat products, low-fat cheese pizza with whole-grain crusts and a shift to serving white meat chicken. Fresh fruits and vegetables became more accessible, and even canned fruits received an upgrade to convenient, easy-to-open fruit cups.

These menu improvements were well-received, reflected in increased student participation compared to the previous year. The committee didn't stop there, introducing "Try It Tuesday" as a brilliant strategy to entice students with monthly samples of new dishes.

The plan, executed with the support of three passionate moms and former chefs with students at Miller and Manning Schools, aimed to encourage healthier meal choices. The commitment of the committee and the expertise of the moms have paved the way for a brighter, healthier future for these young food enthusiasts.

Fun Friday with Mrs. Pool, Food Service Specialist

Mrs. Pool's "Fun Friday" is Manning's exciting new incentive program for good behavior during lunch. Students aim to meet three daily goals: responsibility, cafeteria cleanliness and maintaining noise level 1. Each grade level earns points, and the highest-scoring grade is chosen from rewards like chocolate milk or open seating. Since its launch last month, the program has notably improved cafeteria behavior. Fourth grade dominated until fifth grade recently clinched victory.

Additionally, Mrs. Pool introduced the "Never Repeat a Meal Menu," which was crafted with student input. New menu items include grilled cheese with tomato soup, orange chicken with brown rice and build-your-own pizza. Breakfast offerings now feature strawberry yogurt parfaits and chocolate waffles, among others, along with expanded fruit and vegetable options.
